Peter F. Drucker, a man of unique vision and one of the most influential authors in the field of management, was born in Vienna, Austria, in 1909.


He earned a doctorate in international and public law from the University of Frankfurt and began working as a banker in England. In 1937 he and his wife Doris moved to the United States.

Drucker has written more than two dozen books on management making him one of the world's most widely read and quoted author on the subject. In all of his books, Drucker writes with clarity and wit, illustrating his points with vivid anecdotes. His most recent works include *Post-Capitalist Society and Managing the Non-Profit Organization*.

Drucker's fruitful academic career has included posts at the Graduate Business School of New York University and The Claremont Graduate School, where he has taught since 1971. The Claremont Graduate School has named its graduate management center after him.

A new approach to 'Asia Pacific Studies' is about to be launched. Subjects covering politics, economics and culture have been established in Western countries. But as we face the 21st Century, the central stage of the world is shifting toward the Asia Pacific region. Possessor of rich natural and human resources, diverse cultures, values, languages, religions and social structures, the region has experienced dynamic changes in population and economy, and has formulated a unique society. It is predicted that the majority of the world's mega-cities (over 5 million in population) will be located in this region by 2025. Accordingly, this exciting region faces a number of crucial tasks. To create the brightest possible future, the challenge should be faced with a deep understanding of the current status of the region. Tasks include:

- 1. a comprehensive understanding of the individual and common features of various social and community systems in the Asia Pacific region, and the formation of a network for continuous, peaceful development;
 - 2. the establishment of community systems, social overhead capital

and other necessities to conserve the living environment, especially the urban environment, and the pursuit of a better lifestyle for a growing population;

- 3. the creation and development of industries (information media, tourism, etc.) based on the Asia Pacific region's unique features, and the development of production and environment technologies that are necessary for the growth of the region;
- 4. the reformation of corporate and organizational management, and the development of new management systems that are suitable for the region's business operations through the adaptation of Western and Japanese management styles.

It is difficult to solve these tasks relying only on conventional studies. Therefore, it is necessary to promote new policy-oriented, practical studies based on diversity and uniqueness, coexistence and development, networking and exchange.

In April 2000, Ritsumeikan Asia Pacific University will open. We expect young people enrolled at the university to pursue Asia Pacific studies with classmates from over 50 countries throughout the world.

Ritsumeikan Asia Pacific University — A Model for 21st Century Education.

It seems like everything in the world urges us toward further progress as a huge wave of change approaches. With an eye on 10 years, or 100 years, or even 1,000 years into the future, we approach the 21st Century.

Modern society is an advanced high-tech society that has developed computer networking. The prevalent trend is that computers control mundane, dangerous jobs, while people perform human jobs. The establishment of Ritsumeikan Asia Pacific University follows this trend.

Planned to open in April 2000, Ritsumeikan Asia Pacific University will accept 400 international entrants from over 50 countries, students that have different lifestyles, cultures, languages, religions, philosophies and ways of thinking. They, along with 400 Japanese students, with respect and understanding for each other, will study and discuss problems and seek solutions from various perspectives. It is my hope that the university will develop superb human resources who are willing to play key roles in establishing world peace and helping to create a new civilization for the coming century.

Conventional universities concentrate on developing the left side of the brain which deals with logic, memory and analysis. Ritsumeikan Asia Pacific University, however, will also highlight the brains right side which deals with imagination, creativity, inspiration and executional skills. This new type of education, in which students learn to deal practically with uncertainty and ambiguity, will be a model of education for nurturing potential leaders who have a wide field of vision to meet the needs of the 21st century.

There are a number of prestigious schools throughout the world with hundreds of years of history, and graduates of these schools are now in leading positions in society. Although Ritsumeikan APU is new, it has a superior curriculum, teaching methods and educational system, as well as a unified system of enrollment by recommendation, scholarships, and internships to assist in finding suitable jobs. It is my belief that this university will become one of the most prestigious schools in the world.


Campus of Ritsumeikan Asia Pacific University.

Since the campus ground-breaking ceremony on October 18, 1997, basic construction is almost completed and the outline of the campus will soon be visible. The APU campus is for long-term usage and will be

a venue for education, learning and research, student activities, and living. Since coexistence with nature is held in high regard, the campus includes an amenity zone near its entrance for preserving various endangered plant species. The campus also has a grand view of Beppu Bay and the Pacific Ocean.

Every facility is spacious and



includes a multi-language lounge to encourage students to exchange ideas. In addition, state-of-the-art information equipment has been installed to support information-oriented education using multi-media.

The campus is also open to the local community. The university plans to hold various events and lectures to fulfill its role in exchanging ideas with the community.

Ritsumeikan University has maintained an educational and research policy of openness, internationalism and information-oriented studies. 

A liaison office has been established to interface with society in order to prepare the way for associate research, contributed research, contributed lectures and affiliated subjects. At the Biwako Kusatsu campus, research centers according to subject were built to carry out advanced research in cooperation with industry and government, forming a large research base called Techno Complex. In this environment, networking takes place not only between the faculty and industry but also governmental organizations involved in multidisciplinary study fields. Ritsumeikan University has been ranked first in Japan in a report called Comparative Research Ranks U.S. Engineering Schools Over

A Broad Asia Pacific Regional Network ~ Words from Our Delegates

An explanation of the university and its recruitment were conducted three times: in the July-August period, in November 1997 and January 1998. Visits to educational institutions are proceeding in cooperation with the Indonesian government, the Embassy of Indonesia in Japan, the Japan Foundation, and the Association of International Education, Japan (AIEJ). We deeply appreciate the assistance of Mr. Bambong Soehendro, Director General Higher Education of the Ministry of Education and Culture. Twenty-one institutions including 3 universities and colleges which have Japanese courses, 4 public high schools in Jakarta, 2 public high schools in Yogyakarta, 6 private high schools in Jakarta,

2 private high schools in Yogyakarta, and 4 Japanese language schools were visited. All showed deep interest in the university and were involved in meaningful discussions. According to the schools that were visited, despite a desire to enroll, it is difficult for students to study in Japan due to language problems and the high cost of living and tuition. Therefore, expectations are high for the new university's duallanguage educational system and scholarship program. A Memorandum on Student

Recommendation has been signed by 13 institutions (71 students) and 1 corporation (2 employees). Many institutions requested an explanatory meeting for students. Therefore, we are planning to hold meetings in high schools and

exhibit at the Education Fair in May 1999. The fair will be held by the Ministry of Education and Culture and 200,000 high school students nationwide are expected to attend. We also plan to visit high schools in major local cities (Surabaya, Denpasar, etc.) and the state of Sumatera Barat which has sister with Oita relations Prefecture

The total number of Indonesian students studying in Japan is about 1,000. Approximately 12,500 students study in the U.S.A., and the number of those going to Australia for study is increasing. It is our hope that many students who want to study abroad will come to Japan and enroll at APU.

Press Conference of University Foundation Held in Indonesia.

On January 23, 1998, a press conference took place at the Hotel Sari Pan Pacific in Jakarta to explain the objective of the university and its efforts to recruit students.

Attendees included journalists from 6 national newspapers, teachers from 5 institutions, staff from the Embassy of Japan, the Japan Foundation, AIEJ, and the Association of People of Oita Prefecture

Dr. Sakamoto, President Designate and Prof. Kimura of the Literature Department spoke at the conference. Three high school teachers also stated their support for the new university. Along with photos of attendees, the press conference was well covered in newspapers.

On February 27, 1998, Ritsumeikan University (including APU) and the Vietnam Ministry of Education and Training signed an

Agreement with Vietnamese Ministry of Education and Training Signed.

agreement in the presence of Minister Nguyen Minh Hien. Mr. Nyun, Director of the International Affairs Bureau, then held discussions with Dr. Sakamoto on the agreement, presenting a

proposal to develop programs for student exchange and faculty. Mr.Nyun suggested procedures for dispatching students and expressed an intention to strengthen cultural ties between the two countries as a

part of the cultural program. This epoch-making agreement between a government and a university was based on a long history of exchange between the two parties.



Philippines

The purpose of the visit was: 1) to distribute the APU newsletter to high schools and universities, and research the possibility of attracting students, 2) to explore the possibility of hiring academic advisors and guest professors, 3) to petition the A.Y. Foundation to inform high schools, 4) to study the possibility of agreements with Philippine universities, and 5) to inform Japanese-affiliated companies and The Philippines-Japanese Society and request them to send student recommendations.

We appreciate Dr. Wilfrido V.

Viliacorta, President of Yuchengco Center for East Asia, De La Salle University for his assistance in making appointments and visiting educational institutions. Several schools signed an agreement for student recommendations.

When visiting the A.Y. Foundation, established by Philippine Ambassador Alfonso T. Yuchengco and providing scholarships to high school students, Ms. Gliceria Cuenco, Vice President, accepted our request to distribute the APU newsletter to more than 500 high schools nationwide.

We are also grateful to JETRO for its assistance in making appointments with Dr. Jesus P. Estanislao, President of University of Asia and the Pacific; Cesar E. A. Virata, former prime minister; Dr. Sylvano D. Mahiwo, Associate Professor of University of the Philippines, Mr. Jose S. Laurel III, President Emeritus of The Philippines-Japanese Society and Japanese-affiliated companies. Dr. Estanislao and Mr. Virata confirmed their acceptance to become academic advisors.

Thanks to such support and

networking, we attained the objectives of our visit. It is our hope that these activities will contribute toward recruiting students and promoting a strong relationship between Japan and the Philippines.

Forty attendees from The Association for the Establishment of Ritsumeikan Asia Pacific University and citizen groups of international exchange volunteers shared opinions and ideas.

Overseas institutions with which Ritsumeikan University and APU have cooperative agreements reached 50 as of March 1998.
