

STEP 1

How to Utilize 4 Years at APU

Immediately after enrollment a Career Guidance session is held. Students are advised about the best way to spend their next four years and are asked to respond to a questionnaire on their desired career and field of study. Based on these results, each student is offered advice on career and academic planning.

STEP 2

Visualizing the Future

Students are able to attend a variety of lectures, forums and classes from their first year of study, aimed at helping them to clarify their career goal and to realize what skills and knowledge they need to acquire before graduation in order to achieve this goal. Lectures by international organization executives and personnel at the frontline of various industries are held on a regular basis, as are discussion forums between students and Ritsumeikan University alumni. Students can also register for the Career Development Course, a course through which students form individual career plans and learn more about the business world through research into different industries and companies.

STEP 3

Internship Participation

Internship support is available to students from their very first year of study. Internships help students become aware of their strengths and weaknesses, giving them a taste of the severity and difficulties of being a part of the real working world, overall helping them gain a clearer idea of their future career path.

STEP 4

Career Counseling

Each student is offered advice that is both reflective of their individual goals and skills and in tune with current labor market needs. Resume and entry sheet writing, interview skills and written examination preparation workshops are held to equip students with the foundations required to succeed in their job hunt. Student leaders are chosen for the various job hunting support projects, helping motivate students to help and support each other.

APU Career Office



The staff of experienced professionals in the APU Career Office work towards providing students with a wealth of job hunting related information. The office also facilitates the exchange of information and maintains strong ties with companies who have hired APU graduates. Students are also able to utilize both the Osaka and Tokyo offices as well as the two Career Centers at the Ritsumeikan Kinugasa and BKC campuses.

Career Development

Above providing employment information, the APU Career Office serves as a pipeline linking the career planning of individuals to the needs of society. In the first year, a "Career Chart" is prepared for each student that includes student postgraduate objectives, qualifications, and record of internship participation. In addition to

skill development, students can enhance their awareness of career options through career development programs, designed with sensitivity to students' needs. Students also have the opportunity to fine-tune their career view through participation in internships.



I came to APU to study about Japan's economic development so that I can one day contribute to the growth of underdeveloped nations.

During my second year at high school I spent one year on exchange at Kokawa High School in Wakayama prefecture. It was during this year that I became interested in Japan not only as a country that had achieved dynamic postwar growth but also as a country from which India, my home country, could learn a lot. I decided to come to APU because I was attracted to the dual Japanese-English education program and also because I thought that studying at APU, a university that boasts a large Japanese student body while also providing coursework and lectures in English, could help broaden my horizons. Even before coming to APU I wanted to be able to contribute in some way to the growth of India and other underdeveloped nations. For this reason, and because I am very interested in business management, it was without hesitation that I chose to study in the College of Asia Pacific Management (APM).

Learning about international cooperation and multicultural understanding through presentation coursework and working as a Teaching Assistant (TA).

At APU, I have had the opportunity to be a university dormitory RA (Resident Assistant), a TA (Teaching Assistant) for a first and second year students' seminar class, and an information systems student assistant. In the first year students' seminar class, with Japanese and International students not being able to understand each other, it was a big problem to even get the discussions going. As a TA it was my job to help produce a friendly atmosphere and get the students to relax through playing icebreakers and games. This was a very worthwhile experience that helped me further develop my own communication and leadership skills. Having students from so many different countries gathered together sometimes causes friction. When I did a presentation on India with a student who was from Pakistan, we had very conflicting historical viewpoints. In

the end, we decided to introduce both of our viewpoints in the presentation. This was a valuable experience in that it taught me the importance of respecting other peoples' differences.

Learning about management styles and actively promoting the awareness of Indian culture in the local community.

In my 3rd year seminar class, 'Brands as Managerial Resources: The Significance in Corporate Strategies', we studied real life issues through a number of different case studies. In addition to increasing my Japanese language skills, this class gave me a wealth of knowledge that I think will be a definite asset when I start working next year. In my secondary seminar class, 'Study of Economic Organization: Comparison of Japanese and American Style Management', I studied about the differences in American and Japanese management styles, gaining a lot of valuable hints that will benefit me when working in Japan. In addition to my class work I have been very active in events introducing the Indian culture. In my second year I opened a store selling Indian merchandise as part of the local 'Beppu Dreamval' event. A friend and I also introduced South Indian dances as part of a cultural program in Ajimu town. I have also been very active in extracurricular activities, participating in the badminton and swimming clubs from my second year, and currently as a writer on living in Japan for 'BOUNDLESS', APU's online student newspaper.



My dream is to manage an educational organization that helps bridge the gaps between India and Japan.

While trying to overcome a variety of cultural barriers at APU I have continued to put 100% into everything I do. I have been an honors scholarship recipient for outstanding academic performance on five separate occasions during my time at APU, and this has helped boost my confidence a lot. I believe that my job offer from Toshiba is a direct result of the effort I have put in over the past four years. Toshiba gives its employees the chance to go overseas from very early on in their careers. I am also interested in the Infrastructure Division which makes significant contributions to the development of underdeveloped nations. It is my dream to set up a Cultural Training company in India. 


APU New Challenge

The 2006 Academic Year will bring with it a lot of change here at APU, including the reform of the undergraduate curriculum, the introduction of the Crossover Advanced Program and the promotion of Student Mobility. Through the merging of the major fields in the Colleges of Asia Pacific Studies and Asia Pacific Management, and through giving students the opportunity to learn both academically and practically about key issues facing the Asia Pacific region, APU will be fostering individuals that are even more creative and internationally minded than before.

Curriculum Reforms in the Colleges

In order to strengthen the international viability of APU's educational programs, APU shall implement curriculum reforms to clarify the undergraduate majors, focusing on international management in the College of Asia Pacific Management (APM) and international sociology in the College of Asia Pacific Studies (APS). The College of Asia Pacific Studies will be restructured into the 4 clusters of Comparative Societies and Cultures, International Governance, Environmental Resource Policy and Sustainable Development Studies. The curriculum for the College of Asia Pacific Management will be restructured to concentrate on the areas of Marketing and Corporate Strategy, Accounting and Finance, International Comparative Management and New Business and Innovation.



Crossover Advanced Programs

APU's institutes are interdisciplinary education and research bodies that span several academic fields. They will integrate aspects of the 2 existing colleges and the 2 existing graduate schools and provide programs of study that allow students to progress logically from the undergraduate to the graduate level. In light of APU's achievements to date and the current needs of society, APU will establish the following 5 institutes to deal with the major issues facing the Asia Pacific region.

- Tourism and Hospitality Institute

- Health, Environment and Life Sciences Institute
- International Strategy Institute
- ICT Institute
- Language and Culture Institute

APU will establish unique undergraduate education programs called 'Crossover Advanced Programs' in each institute. These programs will integrate the fields of the College of Asia Pacific Studies and the College of Asia Pacific Management as well as provide programs with potential links to the Masters and Doctorate levels. The goal of these programs is to nurture leaders of the 21st century.

Global Active Learning

APU is introducing an education system that focuses on the type of 'experience' and 'exchange' that students can not acquire through classroom lectures. This system will actively promote practical hands-on learning through domestic fieldwork and internships, overseas exchange and participation in international student conferences.

Graduate School of Management [MBA Program]




Top Executive Lecture Series

Global TV Interview System Recruitment through utilization of the Television Conferencing System

The Global TV Interview System has been up and running at APU since April 2005. This system allows interviews and discussions to be set up to meet the increasing recruitment needs of not just companies in other parts of Japan but also the overseas branches of Japanese companies. The scheduling and organizing of interviews and other parts of the recruitment process can be quite a challenge if the company is far away or overseas. The Global TV Interview System however, allows us to be able to meet company recruitment needs a lot faster and more efficiently. This system has already been used in the successful setting up of recruitment interviews that have led to job placement offers for APU students.



Message from the Media Center

Located in Beppu, Oita prefecture, Ritsumeikan Asia Pacific University (APU) lies 800km from Tokyo, 400km from Osaka and just 100km from Fukuoka, considered to be Japan's gateway to Asia. In fact, Seoul, a mere 650km away, is even closer than Tokyo.

In addition to sharing the university's common goal of contributing to students' growth and learning, at the Media Center we have our own distinct goals that we are working towards: to respond to the rapid advances in IT innovation; to use IT as a tool for overcoming potential problems and constraints at APU; and for the staff of the Media Center to act as consultants, using IT as a vehicle for reform within the university.

The 'Global TV Interview System' (recruitment through television conferencing), as described here, is simply one of our methods of providing support for students. Aside from this, we provide services such as online enrollment, e-learning through WebCT, and online journals and databases that can be viewed off campus through VPN (Virtual Private Network). We plan to continue to concentrate our efforts on using innovation in IT to overcome the traditional constraints of place and time.


Hands-on Career Development Program

INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

Enhancing students' employability through practical work experience

APU's internship program, made possible through the ongoing cooperation of a large number of companies and organizations, is an essential step in the education of students ready to take on the working world. Internships give students an excellent opportunity to gain a wealth of experience, learn about different values and gain a clear and concise career path from their initial years of study at APU. In addition to implementing a system that allows students to gain academic credits for their internship, APU is developing its internship program to make it an integral part of learning at APU. Since its establishment in 2000, APU has sent over 700 students, including approximately 350 international students, on contract internships to over 100 companies, governmental organizations and NGOs both within Japan and abroad. Internships are an excellent opportunity for companies to see first-hand the quality of students studying at APU. A number of companies provide 'direct employment internships', whereby students who successfully fulfill the requirements of the internship are offered full time employment upon graduation. The Career Office will continue to work towards strengthening ties with a wide variety of companies and organizations, increasing the number of individual contract internships on offer to students, while also gathering more information on companies who offer open entry internships.







Access from Fukuoka

Fukuoka, Kyushu's largest city is located northwest of Oita Prefecture. As well as linking the islands of Kyushu and Honshu, Fukuoka is the centre of Kyushu's political, economic, and cultural activities. A convenient way of getting to Beppu from Fukuoka is by highway bus. From Fukuoka International Airport Arrivals, it is possible to take a bus almost as far as the APU gates. It takes approximately 97 minutes. It is also possible to take the non-stop bus from Hakata and Tenjin bus terminals in central Fukuoka. The Sonic Express train runs frequently from Hakata station and will take you to Beppu station in under two hours.

Transport Access to APU

From JR Kamegawa Station (the nearest train station to APU) Take an Oita Kotsu (red stripe) bus (bound for APU), and get off at the APU campus (approx. 15 minutes)

From JR Beppu Station

Take an Oita Kotsu bus (bound for APU) from the East exit (approx. 35 minutes)

Alternatively, take a Kamenoi (blue stripe) bus (bound for APU) from the West exit (approx. 35 minutes)

From Oita Airport

Take an airport limousine bus (Airliner) to the Kamegawa Furuichi bus-stop. Cross the road and then take an Oita Kotsu bus to APU (approx. 60 minutes in total)
